Dear Commissioners.

I am writing to express my most sincere and heartfelt plea that you do not approve any continuation of this program. I have been a homeowner in Hinsdale County since 1993 and have spent 4 to 5 months here every year since 1996. Until the last two summers I have loved my life here and have been an active community member. I have participated in revenue-making shows and art shows for Lake City Arts, have participated in fund-raising programs for the museum and have been a regular docent at the museum. I have been a 'trail angel', providing transportation to Spring Creek Pass for hikers, who contribute financially to Lake City businesses. None of these activities disrupt the gentle atmosphere of a small mountain town. This year the town has been recognized as a Gateway City for the Colorado Trail, and a part of the Dark Skies program. These important organizations can bring revenue for the local economy without harming the ecology of these beautiful mountains.

HOWEVER, in the last two years the increased OHV traffic has greatly greatly disrupted this atmosphere. We have heard the same from quite a few of our friends, both part-year residents and full-year residents. Basically, that this is not the town that we came to love and that our feelings and needs have been ignored in the changes that have been made. In the past we have enjoyed hiking in the backcountry, but the traffic on the back roads has made getting to our favorite trails such an ordeal that there is no pleasure left in the process. We recently heard from friends who had spent summers camping here that they had tried to do the same this year and were so shocked by the crazy noisy congestion that they turned around right away and went elsewhere.

We are so discouraged by the atmosphere of the area this year, especially because this small town is not equipped to handle such crowds, and the tundra and back-country, already under attack by climate changes, cannot survive this onslaught. And law enforcement is not sufficient to manage this traffic! The backroads and highway both have been sorely damaged and we do not have the budget to repair and maintain them.

OHVs are not certified for highway travel, are not safe on highways and only through amazing luck has there not been a terrible accident.

Since September 30 the change has been amazing. The quiet is reminiscent of our early days in Lake City. We are aware of the need for revenue for the town businesses and in past summers have enjoyed patronizing these businesses. This year, because of Covid-19, we have stayed pretty much isolated, but had there not been the virus concerns, the huge crowds would have kept us away most of the time anyway. In the early years of our time here, there were a good variety of stores and restaurants, and I think that there could be again, even without the new crowds. What worries us the most about the changes that the Pilot Program has brought is that the area will soon be damaged beyond repair and that a real treasure will have been destroyed FOREVER.

Thank you for your time and if I can answer any questions you may have about this letter, please let me know. I do love Lake City and I know that we all do. Let's just not ruin it for the people who have been a part of it and have loved it for a long time.

I've had the deep honor of helping many Lake City residents cross to Glory during my tenure as a hospice nurse and local resident.

Because of Lake City's recent vote to allow OHVs to operate in Town combined with CDOT's temporary permit to allow OHV travel on CO149 to County Road 30, Lake City has become an OHV DisneyLand without having to pay any admission fee. I am a State Police Conservation Officer in Texas. I discovered Lake City in 2013 while riding dual-sport motorcycles and have been back every summer since. During the past 2 years we have looked at purchasing property in Hinsdale County due to our love for the area. We have a little girl now who is two years old and our vacations have changed from mostly dual-sport motorcycle riding to mostly OHV riding to be more family friendly. Without the ability to drive our OHV on HWY 149, we would not be able to camp in Hinsdale County and travel the roads and areas we wish to see with our child. I understand why some people have reservations or are against OHV use in town and in particular on Hwy 149. I've seen the increased traffic that the pilot program has brought to the area. However, I believe that the enforcement of the laws and the education attempts have been good, and that there is room to further improve those good efforts to bring even more increases in compliance. My family would be forced to vacation elsewhere if OHV's were banned in town or on HWY149 again. As a point of reference, between fuel, food, shopping, and groceries we spend on average \$800-\$1k each summer in Hinsdale County. I hope that the program will continue so we can continue to support the community while visiting our favorite place on earth.

My suggestion for improving the experience for all users is the same I gave when I observed the OHV checkpoint in August: support local law enforcement and give them the tools to do their jobs, solicit more volunteerism for OHV education and etiquette (like the checkpoint), place more signage and interpretive panels that clearly set expectations for OHV users, and finally, enforce the laws. Also, 2020 was an extreme year in terms of outdoor recreation all over this intry, including OHV use, primarily due to Covid-19. As those new visitors return throughout the years, the education enforcement efforts will be realized and compliance will be further gained. I'd ask anyone to not judge the success of the entire program based on issues that potentially arose in 2020.

Riders starting from other cities along the loop didn't even have that as an option before this pilot program was started.

So do I think it can be a good thing yes. But I think there are other things that need to be incorporated and policed (for lack of a better term) and enforced.


More signage is needed for speed limits and what is allowed and not allowed.

Like many who own property and pay taxes in Lake City, we sincerely hope that the OHV "pilot program" will not be recommended or renewed. The negative environmental and safety impact have already been well documented, so I will not repeat them here.

It seems that the only perceived positive for ATVs in town is "increased business". Although it is questionable that this "positive" outweighs the long range impact on our community, if "increased business" is the only goal, there are many other marketing strategies that would "increase business" without the negative impact of OHV/ATVs in Lake City:

* REGULAR BUSINESS HOURS: It is baffling how town business have erratic and undependable business hours, even during the peak summer season.

*SIGNAGE: Signage perpendicular the the highway and streets. How many people drive through from Gunnison to Creede and vice versa and don't stop to shop or eat. Watching for pedestrian and vehicular traffic, especially during the summer, make it easy for tourists to drive through without noticing businesses. (We don't even have a large legible sign nting one block off the highway to downtown restaurants, shops, galleries, museum, park, etc. We do have small signage on one side of highway, but it is visually camouflaged, again, as through-traffic watches for pedestrians and

traffic.)

CUSTOMER INFORMATION: Customer data (names, email addresses, text info, etc. could be collected for year-round sales promotion).

LAKE SAN CRISTOBAL: This gem makes are area unique! Needs to be promoted. Maybe a Winter Festival of skating, key, youth skiing, cross country skiing, basketball tournament, in addition to the ice-climbing festival. (Of course, road improvement is another issue.)

These are just a few suggestions to improve business without damaging the environment and peaceful ambience of our town. PLEASE consider reversing the decision to allow ATVs in town.

I am a full time resident of Hinsdale County. My permanent residence is in San Juan Ranch Estates subdivision, north of the town of Lake City. I also own property in Wades Addition with frontage on Highway 149 at 500 Gunnison Avenue, just south of the town limits.

My Wades addition property is used to store trailers, etc. that by HOA deed restrictions I am not allowed to permanently park at my residence in San Juan Ranch. In winter I need to use my OHV to plow both of my roperties, as well as occasionally those of neighbors. I would like to be able to use the more direct and safer highway 149 as opposed to a convoluted route on county, town roads and private property to access

both my properties as well as the Alpine Loop back country, Lake San Cristobal, etc, throughout the year.

asy to understand rules that allow access for all vehicle types and users, throughout the year is also essential for the success of a business venture that I'm planning to locate at my 500 Gunnison property.

The pilot project has come to be associated with the Alpine Loop and Tourism. However, access to the highway for residents to plow in winter, run errands, access the back-country using their OHVs should be considered just as important.

The pilot program should be extended from Woodlake RV park south (or the CDot shop) to Elk Road north. It should be made year round. The pilot program should not be used to somehow dictate to residents and visitors when they can use the public highway or manage numbers of tourists that use OHV's. The weather and normal tourist season cycles will do that.

To limit noise, which is the only valid concern for vehicles on Hwy 149, speed limits should be lowered to 25 mph along the entire highway section where OHV's are permitted to operate. This will greatly help reduce noise just outside the city limits to both the north and south, where speed limits increase to 35+ as grades increase, requiring more power (to climb the hills and increase speed) and thus more noise. Encouraging everyone to slow down and enjoy the scenery is always to good thing and slower speeds make it safer for all types of highway users.

I understand that the pilot program allowing ATV usage of Hwy 149 has expired, but can be renewed. We want to see the program continued as it makes Lake City worth being a summer residence for our family. Upon counting, the access program also has been a huge draw for 21 of our friends and their youngsters. They have been able to see and participate in enjoying mountains, scenery, fishing, hiking, and wildlife that they have never before experienced.

During our 3 month secondary home inhabitance in Lake City, we have made many good friends over the last 3 years. I conservatively estimate (actually pretty closely calculated) that our family, friends, and their invitees have spent upwards of \$22,000 per summer in Lake City.
