I am writing to express our support for the flexibility of accessing by ATV and UTV on Highway 149. Our view is that motorized trail riding opportunities in the area support a vibrant economy for local businesses. That reason, plus the observation that a robust riding resource contributes significant value to the quality of life for residents and visitors on the Western Slope.

RE: Colorado Highway 149 Pilot Program

To Whom It May Concern:

I would like to comment on the Colorado Highway 149 pilot program allowing OHV traffic in and south of Lake City. I have lived in Lake City for 47 years and am a businessowner and homeowner.

Here is what I have witnessed this last summer with the increased OHV traffic along Highway 149:

- A substantial increase in OHV visitors to Lake City.
- A substantial increase in visitors to Lake City from all types of vehicles.
- An increase in noise from the increased volume of traffic.
- An increase in speeding by vehicles (of all types) on Highway 149 from Lake City south to the turnoff to Lake San Cristobal.
- An increase in speeding by vehicles (of all types) on Lake City's residential streets.
- An increase in parking problems due to the increased number of trailers transporting OHV vehicles.
- From my business located at 811 Gunnison Avenue, I have regularly witnessed an increase in speeding vehicles from Highway 149 on 8th Street to Bluff Street.
- From my business location, I have regularly witnessed an increase in vehicles running the stop sign located at 8th Street and Silver Street.

Besides the increase of vehicular traffic, I see more congestion as well from people walking and biking along this section of Highway 149. As you know, this stretch of Highway 149 is already narrow and this increased traffic dramatically increases congestion here, especially from late May through September.

I am in hopes CDOT and our local governmental entities can address these concerns. I would think immediate increased signage and presence of regular law enforcement on this stretch of highway would be the first things necessary to intelligently address the matter of speeding violations. The matter of increased parking congestion, noise, the narrow aspect of Highway 149, etc. needs strategic planning for effective solutions.

I know that our local government entities our woefully lacking in financial resources to address all the matters concerning Highway 149 so I would hope CDOT will be an active partner to direct more resources to help out with these situations. Naturally, please contact me if you have any questions; otherwise, I thank you for listening to my concerns and hope that you will participate in bringing solutions to the situation at hand.

mank you for your 20 plus years of public service in Colorado State Government. Being a retired Federal Service worker myself, I have a soft spot in my DNA for public service employees. At times the work is thankless, but dedicated and professional people can always find genuine fulfillment and gratification in their profession. Thank you!

As a resident of Oklahoma, we have had four generations of our family visiting Lake City. My first trip into the area was with my Dad and Mother in 1963 when Slumgullion Pass was a dirt road. We have watched Lake City slowly progress over the years and the newest improvement of allowing OHVs in town is most refreshing. After years of jeeping, we started trailering OHVs into the area in 1996, but the allowance of being able to operate in town and parts of Highway 149 is a Godsend. Thanks for your innovative input to simplify OHV travel in Lake City and the voters of Lake City for the welcomed adjustment.

As regular summer visitor to the area, in fact we spent a week there in Sept this year, I would like to suggest that the Pilot 149 for OHVers continue in the out-years. Your successful innovative approach to allow OHVs to respectfully travel between the scenic points on both sides of Lake City is what allows me as an aging visitor to continue my visits to the area. Without the untethered travel between Pleasant View Resort, eating establishments in Lake City, County Road 30 and County Road 20 my travel days as a visitor would be discontinued. Study shows OHV recreation contributes \$2.3 billion annually to Colorado economy

Denver – A recently completed study commissioned by the Colorado Off Highway Vehicle Coalition and Trails Preservation Alliance documents a yearly contribution of \$2.3 billion to Colorado's economy due to tourism and sales activity linked to off-highway vehicle recreation. The report was prepared by Pinyon Environmental after the 2014 – 2015 season. It shows nearly 200,000 Colorado and non-resident households participated in OHV activity, including motorcycles, ATVs, snowmobiles and 4WDs.


According to the data, motorized recreation enthusiasts spent an estimated \$1.6 billion while taking trips using motorized vehicles for recreational purposes. Motorized recreationists also spent money on maintenance, repairs, accessories, vehicle storage and miscellaneous items associated with their vehicles.

Direct sales of OHVs was estimated to generate \$914 million, while an additional \$882 million was attributed to indirect and induced sales. Over 16,000 jobs are related to the OHV recreation industry in Colorado. \$107 million in state and local taxes were paid during the study period.

Colorado Parks and Wildlife reports that over 170,000 OHV registrations and use permits were issued in 2015. Each annual registration for an OHV costs \$25.25.

The total of all documented sales and use activity by OHV owners and enthusiasts in Colorado is \$2.3 billion, according to the Pinyon Environmental study.

"This report clearly shows the positive economic impact of off-highway vehicle recreation in our great state of Colorado," said COHVCO President Jerry Abboud. "It also points out the importance of providing effective land management and riding opportunities for residents and tourists alike," added Abboud.

Dear Mr. Znamenacek,

We understand that the Highway 149 OHV Pilot Program will soon be up for re-authorization and we write to ask that you terminate or reduce significantly that program which allows OHVs to travel on several miles of that highway near and in Lake City, Colorado. As one of the early proponents of this program, we think that your opinion will matter a great deal.

We have been summer residents of Lake City for 26 years. We built there because of the quiet beauty of the town, our ability to drive or hike in the back country, and the excellent fishing nearby. We also have enjoyed shopping in the town, frequenting restaurants, and walking the trail system.

All of that has changed because of the infestation of OHVs, created by the Pilot Project. We no longer go into town unless we must. We shop elsewhere when we can. We have tried driving our Jeep on the Alpine Loop, but the noise and dust from speeding OHVs is so bad that we no longer make that drive.

We attended an outdoor meeting next to the library, regarding the planning for a charitable project that will cater to young children's reading. The OHV noise was so loud and frequent that we had to practically shout to be heard.

There is strong evidence that the tremendous increase in OHV traffic is contributing significantly to the deterioration of both county roads 20 and 30. In our one attempt at the loop this summer we noticed that county road 30 was as bad as we have ever seen it (we turned back and returned home). And we have seen photos of serious damage to the tundra in the high country.

OHVs have no place on a paved highway; their name makes that clear – Off -Highway Vehicles. They constitute a dangerous situation and it is fortunate that there has not been a serious OHV- auto accident. It will happen. It's only a matter of when.

In short, Lake City is no longer the place we decided to spend our summers. The Pilot Program has ruined it. I am sure that some merchants are happy, but not all merchants have benefited. Lake City has become a burger, trinket and t-shirt town. The OHV lobby must be ecstatic. But the cost to the area is incalculable. You might want to visit Lake City in July or August to see and hear what we mean. But please don't bring your OHV.

I am a homeowner and business owner in Lake City, Colorado. We own and use OHV's and have welcomed the ability to drive on Hwy 149 that has been provided by the state's pilot program. Our cabin guests are constantly telling me how happy they are that they can ride their OHVs on the hwy and access both sides of the loop, and that this is the main reason that they keep coming to Lake City instead of neighboring towns. I am requesting the extension of the pilot program for another 3-5 years with the possible extension to include use of hwy 149 to Woodlake Park on the south side and to the car wash or Elk Road on the North end. These extensions would be very beneficial for our use and our guests to access both side of the loop and to keep the traffic off the side roads by allowing people to use the hwy to the car wash. I believe that if people are required to trailer OHVs that it will create a parking nightmare at the start of the loop with trucks and trailers not having sufficient parking to use. Based on many comments from our renters, I also believe that if OHVs can't access both sides of the loop via hwy 149, that we are going to lose a lot of our tourism business to other towns, which will significantly impact so many of our local families that are also business owners. My name is Dr. Lesli Wood. I live in Evergreen, Colorado and am a Professor at the Colorado School of Mines. You might be only the second Zane that I have ever "met". I work with a Zane Jobe at Colorado School of Mines. As a bit of background, I have owned a 76-acre property up Hinsdale County Road 30, along with five co-owners, since 2008. You, I have met only through your responses to individual letters that others have sent to me. I will tell you that I think your responses are amazingly patient, professional and measured.

I find myself this morning looking out at a beautiful lake in Tuscaloosa Alabama, after a kayak. We drove up here to see my Dad. I do miss the eastern hardwood forests. I started a letter to you nearly a month ago, but got tied up at school, and so have found myself reading an additional month's worth of emails. These email are all from individuals who have been passionately involved in the issue of OHVs in Hinesdale County and their access to Colorado State Highway 149 for many years; Ron Bruce, Jud Hollingsworth, David Cherry, Peter Nesbitt and many others. I find my concerns changing each day and appreciate the opportunity to air those concerns with you, as I am told that your professional evaluation and input is a critical part of the process in the Colorado Transportation Commission's consideration to re-approve, and possibly extend the opening of County Road 30 to OHV traffic.

I was not deeply engaged in the original Lake City and Hinsdale County request for the CO149 Pilot program, as I could not see the impact on my property up at American Basin. However, once it was enacted, I immediately became aware of the impact. The use numbers on County Road 30, since 2018 speak for themselves (see SilverWorld Newspaper, Friday September 11, 2020 "Alpine Loop Traffic up over 50 percent says BLM study"). Although it is difficult to pinpoint the specific cause-and-effect issues surrounding this massive impact, I think it is important that we recognize the impact on state and county roads, as well as the costs of joint state and federally-funded repairs that are now necessary to the roads, facilities and public lands.

The upward growth of usage numbers noted above are not totally driven by out of state OHV users, however these users are a big component. The CO149 Pilot program creating this "traffic link" and closing the Alpine Loop "horse shoe" has exacerbated a management nightmare on the federal lands in this pristine region. The county has one town in it and thus the county and town act as one entity. I fully understand the town and county drivers, and I understand that there are a few veryvociferous and strong opinions regarding anything that involves OHV access. However, I hope that on the state level, which you represent, local issues are balanced with consideration of the larger impacts for a Colorado citizen such as myself.

I find my concerns more recently to be the effect that this CO149 linkage issue is having on the community. I visit LC quite frequently and find business owners telling me in hushed tones that they would prefer the OHVs "not be quite so many". LC Town Trustees are balancing the need for economic survival against at least 40% of the populous (previous community vote in 2018), who wish to return to a quieter existence. They hear from seasonal homeowners are tired of paying 70% of the county's property taxes and getting shut down in their attempts to encourage a balanced approach to OHVs. The Sheriff struggles to police a massive increase in high mountain traffic with increasingly limited resources, but must balance his commitment to support the local economy. Even Mr. Bruce, who lives on Ocean Wave Drive in Lake City stated in a recent email "....Because so many of OHV operators desire to hose off the road grime they accumulate while traveling the Loop, they cannot drive directly to the car wash. Instead this moves them to travel up and down Ocean Wave,.... We get significant OHV troffic on Ocean Wave Drive past the front of our home as a result.... a significant amount of dust is thrown up, even w/mag-chloride application. " I understand Mr. Bruce's frustration.

This sentiment is understandable, as we could all make a lot of money if we could invent a dust-free road! OR a quiet OHV! Simply shifting these drivers to state roads is not the answer. I listen to OHV rental agencies in LC and a few restaurants owners talk about how ubiquitous support is for this CO149 opening and extension, but I just am not seeing it.

I DON'T have a dog in the hunt for allowing OHVs in Lake City, Colorado. That has to be driven by business owners and home owners who stand up for what they want their town to be. But, I DO have opinions on opening up a state road that is maintained with a mix of state and federal funds for a majority of out of state users. I DO think that it would be

good to have a "cooling down" period so tax payers and citizens alike can breathe a bit, voice their opinions and really consider what is best for the town and county. My name is Dr. Lesli Wood. I live in Evergreen, Colorado and am a Professor at the Colorado School of Mines. As a bit of background, I have owned a 76-acre property up Hinsdale County Road 30, along with five co-owners, since 2008. I would like to register my opposition to re-approval of the CO149 Program that opens up CO149 to Off-Highway Vehicles as it stands.

I have read a lot of email and counter email in the past several months. These email are all from individuals who have been passionately involved in the issue of OHVs in Hinesdale County and their access to Colorado State Highway 149 for many years; Ron Bruce, Jud Hollingsworth, David Cherry, Peter Nesbitt and many others. I find my concerns changing each day and but they all point to a need to step back and reconsider some of the changes that have been made that have affected not only the town of Lake City but those of us who live in the surrounding areas, on country roads that are being destroyed by the additional traffic that the opening in 2018 facilitated. With that additional traffic has come an increase in bad behavior drivers (ie., 10% bad behavior drivers of 100 users is 10, 10% of 54,000 users is 5,400). It has gotten quite ridiculous.

I was not deeply engaged in the original Lake City and Hinsdale County request for the CO149 Pilot program, as I did not expect impact on the landscape, my sanity and the roads up to American Basin. However, once the CO149 Pilot was enacted, I immediately became aware of the impact. The use numbers on County Road 30, since 2018 speak for themselves (see SilverWorld Newspaper, Friday September 11, 2020 "Alpine Loop Traffic up over 50 percent says BLM study"). Although it is difficult to pinpoint the specific cause-and-effect issues surrounding this massive impact, I think it is important that we recognize the impact on state and county roads, as well as the costs of joint state and federally-funded repairs that are now necessary to the roads, facilities and public lands.

Administrator Hines,

My wife Andrea and I are seasonal residents of Hinsdale County and appreciate the opportunity to provide feedback on the OHV Pilot program. The natural beauty of Lake City, the majestic San Juans and the countless outdoor activities are what prompted my wife and I to build a home in Lake City. We actually hauled an OHV from Naples, Florida to Lake City when we moved into our home there because state and county officials in Collier County essentially eliminated access to OHV's. The Alpine Loop is one of our favorite activities whether we are behind the wheel of our Toyota FJ or an OHV and a must do activity when we host visitors.

However, you knew that was coming right (a), the amount of noise from the exhaust and/or tires from the OHV's, particularly this past summer/fall, was noticeable. Our home is in Park Creek above Vicker's Ranch and a good ½ mile or more from 149 and we could hear them clearly – starting their riding very early in the morning and lasting into the night. Sitting on the porch wasn't as peaceful this year. Worth noting – we cannot hear cars, Jeeps and/or trucks at all. In addition, while on the Loop a couple of times this summer/fall we observed OHV's speeding and riding off trail - the damage caused by OHV's going off trail is heartbreaking. Just like most things – those observations were the exception but they tend to ruin it for the rest and the damage in some cases is irreversible at least in our lifetimes.

Perhaps some modifications to the pilot program would satisfy the majority of the stakeholders (business owners, current home owners and visitors alike) some of whom may become future home owners. Proposed solutions: more law enforcement (backcountry ranger and sheriff's office), establish a noise ordinance with permissible levels of operation and speed monitoring and enforcement on 149 and the Loop, limiting the hours OHV's can travel on 149 south of the town, limiting their travel to within the town proper, charging use fees to pay for the increase law forcement presence.

The disagreements and elections surrounding this issue are not lost on me and realize you won't make everyone happy BUT I do appreciate you soliciting feedback and the opportunity to provide mine. Good luck and if I can be of assistance, serve on a focus group, etc. don't hesitate to contact me.
